18 Ways To Encourage Parents To Become Volunteers

- 1. Use a low-key approach. In your face tactics are turn-offs.
- 2. Talk to the parents that complain (a lot). Let them write the check and cash it with their services.
- 3. Try to keep track of newly enrolled students and introduce yourself and your team.
- 4. Work to get parents and teachers together in the same room. Parents love feeling connected!
- 5. Take advantage of Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and other social media apps.
- 6. Let your friends know about the parent volunteer work you do. Then encourage them to help.
- 7. Give a Special Parent Volunteer perk each month.
- 8. Ask for feedback after every event. Parent Involvement and Parent Voice is mandatory in our work!
- 9. Find out which parent volunteers may need childcare and then try to provide the services.

- 10. Ask parents what they want to do and where do they see their talents can be used.
- 11. Give shy or low-key parents behind-the-scenes jobs.
- 12. Ask all parents to volunteer for at least 20 hours in a school year. The time will add up tremendously!
- 13. Connect with neighborhood advocates. They may want to help.
- 14. Get local companies to offer incentives to event helpers. (i.e. Dunkin Donuts, IHOP, Shoprite, etc.)
- 15. Woo incoming kindergarten parents. Encourage them to run for office positions. **They are a hot commodity!**
- 16. Do something unexpected at meetings. (A cook-off, a book author signing, spaghetti dinner)
- 17. Always show sincere appreciation to everyone including your student volunteers.
- 18. If possible, offer to give parents a ride so they can volunteer.
